Mike is Chair of the National Suspected CES pathway produced by Getting it Right First Time ("GIRFT"). The pathway aims to support clinicians in effectively diagnosing and treating CES without delay. Justin will join him to discuss repercussions in the medico-legal context and issues that generally arise in CES claims.

Mr. Victor Ameh MBBS, MA(Law&Ethics), FRCSEd, FRCEM, FEWI, MCMI Consultant in Emergency Medicine

Mr Victor Ameh is a consultant in Emergency Medicine (A&E) at the Royal Albert Edward infirmary in Wigan, Greater Manchester, a large teaching hospital and a Trauma unit. He is a senior consultant in full time clinical practice. He has undertaken postgraduate specialist training in Emergency Medicine and General Surgery in the United Kingdom. He completed his higher specialist training in Emergency Medicine which led to the award of the Certificate of Completion of Training (CCT) in Emergency Medicine. He is a Fellow of both the Royal College of Emergency Medicine and the Royal College of surgeons of Edinburgh. He holds a Masters degree in Medical Law and Ethics from the University of Keele. He is an honorary senior lecturer with both the University of Manchester, faculty of health sciences as well as the University of Edge Hill Medical School. He is the Lead for Specialist Training and Royal College tutor at his current Trust. His external roles include being a senior examiner with the Royal College of Emergency Medicine, the University of Manchester Medical School, a General Medical Council Associate and Expert Witness in Emergency Medicine. He is a Fellow of the Faculty of Expert Witnesses for Doctors, and of the Expert Witness institute. He is also a member of the Chartered Institute of Management. He previously worked as a spine surgeon at The Royal Devon & Exeter Hospital from 2007 to 2021 undertaking complex spine procedures in all areas of spinal surgery including paediatric and adult spine deformity. Mike held an executive position on the British Association of Spine Surgeons from 2009 to 2019 and led the British Spine Registry from 2012 to 2019. He was an expert advisor to the MHRA from 2012 to 2021. He has developed a National Emergency Referral Tool which links to the British Spinal Registry and is currently the co-chair of the Spinal Orthopaedic Data Evaluation Panel and Beyond Compliance programme. Mike is the chair of the National Suspected Cauda Equina Pathway improvement programme and an affiliate member of the NHSE Spinal Service Clinical Reference Group. He is also the clinical lead for the spinal National Consultant Information Programme (NCIP) and he developed the Spinal Services dashboard on 'The Model Hospital'. Mike chaired and developed the Spinal High Volume/Low Complexity (HVLC) pathway programme. His GIRFT national report on Spinal Services was published in January 2019. He has subsequently visited and reported on the spinal independent sector and is a co-author of the 'Learning from Litigation claims' national report in May2021. Mike is a former professional rugby player and still follows the sport with a passion.
